Trinity Methodist Church is registered with the Charity Commission Charity Number 1129116 and is managed under the Constitution Practice and Discipline of the Methodist Church of Great Britain. The Church Council is responsible for overseeing the life of the church and delegates its responsibilities to various groups and the leadership team consisting of the minister, treasurer and the stewards. The main groups are World Service and Mission, Pastoral, Finance, Property, Events Co-ordinating Committees and the Worship Consultation which contribute to church life in worship and proclaiming the message of the Lord Jesus Christ. Thanks are expressed to all who exercise leadership and who have served the church in the past year.

OUR AIM AND VISION

Our Mission Statement is ... To witness to our Christian faith by sharing the love of God with all, through worship, learning and service

The Church Council has adopted this **Vision Statement**:

Mission: Our task is to proclaim and explain the Christian faith and help people to become disciples of Jesus Christ. We do this by showing God's love in the way we care for one another and live our lives both as individuals and as a community.

Worship: We are committed to offering worship which is attractive and joyful; warm and inclusive, thoughtful and reflective; challenging and converting. We want our worship to be full of wonder, love and praise. Our music draws upon the best of traditional and contemporary forms. We value preaching which feeds God's people.

Advocacy: We want to be a church which helps its members and friends to express what we believe as Methodist Christians in an authentic, natural and loving way. This will allow space for honest doubt. Small groups (especially house groups) have an important role to play in building confidence to do this.

Friends of All: We want to be a friendly church where "all are welcome"; caring for children, young people, parents and families whilst ensuring that people of every generation, background and Christian belief are valued and involved.

Generous Life: We want to be a church which recognises and celebrates what God is doing in our lives and respond generously in the use of our time, our abilities and treasure. We recognise that this will take many forms within and beyond the institution of the church. We acknowledge that we have different and special gifts so sometimes we will need to be released from doing something we are doing already to do something new or different.

This annual report describes how we seek to achieve that aim and realise our vision. It has been compiled from submissions made by those organisations which wished to report on what they saw as new work or developments in the past year. The absence of a report in no way diminishes the significance or importance of what has been done in the last year.

The Leadership Team: The Leadership Team comprises The Minister, The Church Treasurer and the six Church Stewards. We meet every month for Fellowship, Prayer and attending to the Business of running the Church on a day to day basis. The Stewards are responsible for ensuring that the Church is ready each week for the Sunday Services and to assist the Preacher in the preparation and conduct of Worship.

We are very grateful to Eyo Inameti who has been a steward for six years and we are very sorry to lose him from the vestry. He is retiring at the end of June.

We were very pleased to welcome Rev. Debbie Borda as our new minister in September along with her husband Freddie. Sadly due to Freddie's illness we were not able to get to know him before his untimely death in March. Along with the District and the Circuit we are doing our best to support Debbie through this difficult time. We are very pleased to have her in our midst and thank her for all she has achieved despite having to look after Freddie as well as all of us.

Being a steward is a very important role and without the leadership team the church and our services would not run smoothly. Perhaps you could help Trinity run even more smoothly with new ideas and fresh energy. If so please speak to one of us. Although I shall remain as a steward for another year, I am standing down as Senior Steward at the end of June and will be handing the baton to John Davies.

Recently, I received an email enquiry and a telephone call following an internet search. Both of these queries were as a result of their children wanting to find out for themselves what M C is all about. If we can engage the child then it's a good way in for accompanying adults who have little or no church experience but are curious to see what it's all about.

We look forward to working into our 7th year in May, with Debbie's expert knowledge and experience to support us. A regional meet up in June and feedback from the first

international conference in May will provide useful insight into the local and worldwide Messy Church organisation, in our own continuing development in faith and practice.

By the time this report is read, we shall have said 'Goodbye' to four much loved members. Eileen Fox, after many years service, has decided that, because of ill health, she is unable to attend church, at least for the time being. Marlene and Dennis Heath have moved to High Wycombe to be closer to Rachel and her family, and Donald Campbell shortly will move back home to the Isle of Lewis where he will be closer to his family. This is all a great loss to the choir. All of these singers are very competent and experienced and will be missed. I thank them very much for their friendship, service and devotion.

We could not function without the support of excellent pianists and organists and I thank, as ever, Anne, Barbara and Val for their support on the rota or on Friday nights.

Trinity Occasional Catering Team (TOCT). In 2015, TOCT catered for 19 events: 4 lunches (3 at Trinity); 6 funerals; 3 birthdays (one double 50th, one 96th and one 100th); one all-day staff training day; one tea for a visiting coach party; one Golden Wedding; one Diamond Wedding; one Harvest Supper and one Film and Food evening. TOCT's initial purpose was to cater for visiting coach parties but we are now also enjoying the challenge of outside catering at people's homes or other public venues.

We are sad to lose Marlene and Dennis Heath from our team as they move away, but have been glad to welcome Val and Chris Spencer as they move back to Bury, and Chris Clarke, whose mother is a member of Luncheon Club.

Our financial contribution to the church from the year August 2014 - August 2015 was £2,562. This does not include money raised from events beyond August 2015.

An evening is being organised when team members and others who wish to do so can update their Food Hygiene Certificates.

We are very fortunate to have a team with such a high level of expertise, of standards of presentation and of commitment, and are grateful to them for all that they do and have done. *Anne Dean.*

Trinity Luncheon Club: Luncheon club continues to be a popular meeting place for food, friendship and fellowship. Our membership is 28 at the moment as transport is always difficult and we have to ask our members to make their own way to the lunch. This can be quite trying for some. Our charge is £3 for a home-cooked 2-course lunch with tea or coffee and after expenses were taken we gave £200 to church funds. We are grateful to all our volunteer helpers who give of their time and skills to keep this outreach project continuing. The West Suffolk college prepared and served a meal one week for which the members were really thrilled. We hope they will visit us again. God's love is 'Work in Action', long may we show this love at Trinity.

Events and Social Committee Report. Several years ago when we were in the midst of raising funds for essential building works, the Fundraising Committee was formed, for the purpose of organising events. Over the years the emphasis of the committee changed, raising money became less important and creating opportunities for people to meet socially became the primary objective; although nearly all events managed to show a profit. Over time the committee fell into disrepair, there was probably more than one reason for this, but the main one was simply that we had worn ourselves out and had in effect used up all our ideas. Some things like the successful film nights carried on, largely because they had become part of Trinity tradition. Of one thing I am certain, it is essential that Trinity has a social life; so when Debbie asked me to resurrect the committee, I was pleased to do so.

The committee itself is very much a think tank, and with an influx of new members fresh ideas have been put forward and added to our diary. On occasions we will ask others to organise and run events on our behalf, but will always be there to offer both practical and emotional support. Already we have held a successful Trinity Quiz Night, organised by David and Anne Dean ably supported by committee members. Dennis Heath has organised a concert by the Bury Male Voice Choir and Chris Spencer has taken on the role of arranging monthly walks the first of which has already taken place, if you are interested in joining a walk contact Chris for dates and venues, transport is arranged for those without cars. In June and August there will be two special walks, one ending with a picnic in the Abbey Gardens and one concluding with a pub lunch; in between there will be a coach outing to a place of interest, and the film evening returns to its November slot.

We realise that not every event will suit everyone, but we hope that within the programme there will be something of interest to each and every one of you, and if there isn't then do tell us and perhaps suggest something that you would like to be included – we will do our very best to bring it to fruition.

Christian Aid. Thanks to the support that Christian Aid receives at Trinity with folk being generous with their time and money, we raised £1712.14 during Christian Aid Week 2015.

In addition we had a stall selling muffins in Bury market and also a "bucket collection" around the market which proved a good way of raising money by all the Bury churches.

Christian Aid's special project for maternal health care in Nigeria was also well supported and raised over the £2,000 pledged by Bury Christian Aid which "pump-primed" a grant from the EU, bringing it up to £10,000. Trinity alone contributed £400 to this project from the proceeds of our 'Open Gardens'.

This year Christian Aid Week is May 15th to 21st and we will have, in addition to the street collection, a "bucket collection" outside Tesco's on May 21st.

This year's special project is for Women's Health & Education in Ethiopia which will help women to hold their rightful place in Ethiopian society. Bury has pledged £4,000 and, if raised, will again "pump prime" a grant from the EU to make it £20,000. Thank you for your continued support.

Circuit Mission Action Team: Adrian Romano is still receiving the World Church Relationships Bulletin from Sarah Friswell by email each month and duly forwarded this around the Circuit – to ministers and various office holders, so that hopefully it will reach as many people as possible.

The Circuit Mission Action Team met on Thursday 18th February at Trinity Methodist Church. Highlights from the last meeting:-

- Trinity, Bradfield, St John's (Sudbury), Northumberland Avenue, Ixworth and Stowmarket Methodist Churches were all represented;
- It was proposed that churches could submit written reports for future meetings, as a significant number of churches in the Circuit were not represented;
- Feedback from the Circuit Event on Saturday 17/10/2015 -
 - Andy from Christian Solidarity Worldwide gave a thought-provoking talk about the persecuted Church.
 - This incorporated the relationship between faith and politics plus specific types of oppression people face in different parts of the world.
 - Additionally, Andy touched upon how hard mission can be in supposedly "Safe" places.
 - There were 27 people attending the talk with 24 for the meal beforehand.
 - A good range of literature was available, which was well-received.
 - The event covered its costs, with Andy receiving £152.00 including mileage plus a £50.00 donation towards the work of CSW.
- <u>Proposed Future Circuit Event</u>: The next Circuit event was proposed for Saturday 29/10/2016 6:30pm at Trinity. This will centre on Fair Trade, with John Boardman speaking following his recent visit to Sri Lanka and also featuring Diocesan Fair Trade Representative Richard Stainer and his wife Christine, who have recently been to Nicaragua.
- Mention was also made of a Kenyan tea plantation manager visiting Bury for Fair Trade fortnight (29/02/2016 – 13/03/2016), who will speak at Trinity on Sunday 13th March.
- Proposals were made for moving away from the traditional assignment of Mission in Britain Sunday on the first Sunday in Advent. Instead, a Circuit Mission in Britain event will take place on 26/02/2017, with a big event in February the following year plus World Mission envelopes being distributed in October 2017, but with no World Mission event.
- <u>Reports from Churches on Mission</u> were received from Ixworth, Trinity, Stowmarket, Northumberland Avenue and St John's, Sudbury.

Suffolk Historic Churches Trust Annual Sponsored Cycle Ride: Last year was another very successful year for Trinity with the SHCT Sponsored Cycle Ride, also known as "Ride and Stride". This took place on Saturday 12th September. I would like to take this opportunity to say a big "Thank You!" to everyone who assisted by staffing the church on the day and for sponsorship – a grand total of £564.00 was raised.

As you will probably know already, half the money raised goes to Trinity, and half to the ongoing work of the Trust. You may be interested to know that around £137,000 was raised throughout the County last year, and this is seen as a fine sum by Cycle Ride Chairman Patrick Grieve.

As always, the ride takes place at the same time as the Heritage Open Day in Bury St Edmunds, when people can access buildings of historic and/or architectural significance that are not normally open to the public. Last year, we also ran a successful book sale in the downstairs hall which drew a lot of people onto the church premises.

Preparations are already under way for 2016's event, which will take place on 10th September. Marian Shaw, the SHCT Thingoe Area Local Organiser, has been in touch

earlier in March by email with the Parish Return forms. I have duly filled these in and delivered them in anticipation of Trinity's taking part in this year's ride.

This means that later in the year I will be on the lookout for people to staff the church as Recorders plus anyone willing to participate as walkers or riders? I am not able to participate as a rider this year owing to a significant family event taking place on 10/09/2016, but still wish Trinity to play our part in supporting this inter-church event with a view to being able to participate again as a rider in September 2017!

Churches Together: Churches Together in Bury St Edmunds and the surrounding area plays an important part in witnessing in the town. Many organisations come under the umbrella of Churches Together. The newest venture has been the Drop In Centre for those seeking help, which provides food and assistance.

The Good Friday Walk this year due to various reasons was on a smaller scale; however almost record numbers filled the Cathedral before walking to the Abbey ruins for a short service.

Ecumenical Prayer Breakfasts continue to be held every two to three months: an opportunity to share fellowship over a meal. Trinity will be hosting a Prayer Breakfast on Saturday 25th June. 8am-10am.

The popular Study and Share will return for four Wednesdays commencing 20th April. A diverse range of subjects will be bought by local leaders for thought, for study and discussion. All are welcome - each study is a stand alone study. Come when you can.

Property Committee: The most significant matter to have been dealt with in the past year was the damp proofing work to the South wall of the church. This appears to have been very successful and enabled good use of the adjoining spaces and much improved appearance on the fire escape stairs and rooms behind the kitchen and boiler room.

Advertisement permission was obtained and two new Notice boards erected in front of the Church hopefully making our presence more noticeable and our notices more effective.

New accessories including more efficient hand driers have been installed in the toilets.

Later in the year the Quinquennial Inspection was carried out. This reported no evidence of major structural defects but commented on a number of areas which would benefit from redecoration or new finishes. These were already under consideration by the Property Committee. There are two minor areas of dampness at low level in the old external wall in the corridor from the new fire escape, but these are not thought to be significant. Repairs to the boundary walls will be considered carefully once issues of ownership are investigated. New floor coverings are being considered for the staircase areas and various other rooms including covering rather than replacing the old thermoplastic tiles. Other minor works in the Urgent category are already being dealt with.

The other particular issue for us are the seals on the double glazed windows which have failed to a large extent. The possible treatment to remedy this is likely to cost some £4500 but with an anticipated life-span of only 5 years or so will need to be considered carefully.

The meeting in March was the final meeting for Dennis Heath who is moving. Brian De'Ath and John Moore agreed to join John Chambers and John Davies as property Stewards.

My telephone number and email address are on the church website or in the church directory, and I would be pleased to hear from them and show them around if necessary.

If you do need to use a room for any purpose, please do check that it is available first. It is important from a safety point of view that we know who is using our building and when. If I am not available, the members of the Leadership Team also have access to the diary.

Financial Review for year ended 31.8.15

The year ended with a deficit of £3085, against a surplus of £1155 last year. The main reasons for this were:

- a) Increase or £3000 for Circuit Assessment
- b) Reduction in gift aid of £700
- c) Fall in number of lettings of £900

Our main income – Offertories and gifts remained the same.

Due to a number of deaths and people moving away, our regular giving will be down by approx. £5000 in the coming year, and the Circuit Assessment will increase by a further £3000. We need to encourage members to re-assess their giving.
