GOSPEL READING

Matthew 28 : 1 – 10 New International Version

Jesus has risen

After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look at the tomb.

2 There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and, going to the tomb, rolled back the stone and sat on it. 3 His appearance was like lightning, and his clothes were white as snow. 4 The guards were so afraid of him that they shook and became like dead men. 5 The angel said to the women, 'Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. 6 He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. 7 Then go quickly and tell his disciples: "He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him." Now I have told you.'

8 So the women hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy, and ran to tell his disciples. 9 Suddenly Jesus met them. 'Greetings,' he said. They came to him, clasped his feet and worshipped him. 10 Then Jesus said to them, 'Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me.'

SERMON

Matthew 28 : 1

At dawn on the first day of the week Mary and Mary went to the tomb.

and from verse 7

He is not here; he is risen

As we walk through very different times to that of previous years try to look at the story through new eyes. Easter is a living experience for us and we have to go down into our hearts.

Try to capture the emotions, the vision, the experience, the wonder of it all.

The walk – this is personal emotion; you are taking that journey to the tomb, why are you going there after all you know that Jesus is dead?

The wonder – what earth has taken place over the last few days, what will the future hold?

The emotion – there in front of you is Jesus and he is talking to you, what is he saying to you?

The Sufi mystic Rumi says "the quieter you become, the more you are able to hear" We are used to noise and of busyness, but now as many are self-isolating we can use this time to look at the Easter story in a different way.

Today in the quietness Mary approached the tomb, in the quietness we approach the tomb, in the quietness of our lives we can hear so much more. Mary was asked to tell people that he is alive. In our actions and reactions we too witness that Jesus is alive.

The Resurrection account begins, 'Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark....' With these opening words, we already see that this is a story of new life, new birth. To a first-century Jewish listener, 'The first day' would suggest the first verses of the Book of Genesis, and the first day of creation:

"Darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters".

And
"God said, 'Let there be light: and there was light'."

Darkness is a powerful metaphor for God and faith. 'God' is always beyond our reach, always beyond our understanding, and similarly, 'faith' is a journey made not with physical sight but in the darkness: in the soul, we are constantly reaching out, stretching forward in the hope of encounter with the Eternal.

And so Easter Day this year will have new meaning to us all, but it is a message of hope. And in these times when we may struggle, or be scared, or worry, then in the darkness let us reach out our hand and realise that the tomb is empty, Christ is risen, and he gives us the hope to go forward in faith.

Christ is risen; he is risen indeed
Alleluia!

- 1 Come, and let us sweetly join
Christ to praise in hymns divine ;
give we all with one accord
glory to our common Lord,
hands and hearts and voices raise,
sing as in the ancient days,
antedate the joys above,
celebrate the feast of love.
- 2 Jesu, dear expected Guest,
thou art bidden to the feast ;
for thyself our hearts prepare,
come, and rest, and banquet there.
Sanctify us, Lord, and bless,
breathe thy Spirit, give thy peace ;
thou thyself within us move,
make our feast a feast of love.
