**Old Testament Reading** *Ruth chapter1 NIV* In the days when the judges ruled, there was a famine in the land. So a man from Bethlehem in Judah, together with his wife and two sons, went to live for a while in the country of Moab. <sup>2</sup> The man's name was Elimelech, his wife's name was Naomi, and the names of his two sons were Mahlon and Chilion. They were Ephrathites from Bethlehem, Judah. And they went to Moab and lived there.

<sup>3</sup> Now Elimelech, Naomi's husband, died, and she was left with her two sons. <sup>4</sup> They married Moabite women, one named Orpah and the other Ruth. After they had lived there about ten years, <sup>5</sup> both Mahlon and Chilion also died, and Naomi was left without her two sons and her husband.

Naomi and Ruth return to Bethlehem

<sup>6</sup> When Naomi heard in Moab that the LORD had come to the aid of his people by providing food for them, she and her daughters-in-law prepared to return home from there. <sup>7</sup> With her two daughters-in-law she left the place where she had been living and set out on the road that would take them back to the land of Judah.

<sup>8</sup> Then Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, 'Go back, each of you, to your mother's home. May the LORD show you kindness, as you have shown kindness to your dead husbands and to me. <sup>9</sup> May the LORD grant that each of you will find rest in the home of another husband.' Then she kissed them goodbye and they wept aloud <sup>10</sup> and said to her, 'We will go back with you to your people.'

<sup>11</sup> But Naomi said, 'Return home, my daughters. Why would you come with me? Am I going to have any more sons, who could become your husbands? <sup>12</sup> Return home, my daughters; I am too old to have another husband. Even if I thought there was still hope for me – even if I had a husband tonight and then gave birth to sons – <sup>13</sup> would you wait until they grew up? Would you remain unmarried for them? No, my daughters. It is more bitter for me than for you, because the LORD's hand has turned against me!'

<sup>14</sup> At this they wept aloud again. Then Orpah kissed her mother-in-law goodbye, but Ruth clung to her.

<sup>15</sup> 'Look,' said Naomi, 'your sister-in-law is going back to her people and her gods. Go back with her.'

<sup>16</sup> But Ruth replied, 'Don't urge me to leave you or to turn back from you. Where you go I will go, and where you stay I will stay. Your people will be my people and your God my God. <sup>17</sup> Where you die I will die, and there I will be buried. May the LORD deal with me, be it ever so severely, if even death separates you and me.' <sup>18</sup> When Naomi realised that Ruth was determined to go with her, she stopped urging her.

<sup>19</sup> So the two women went on until they came to Bethlehem. When they arrived in Bethlehem, the whole town was stirred because of them, and the women exclaimed, 'Can this be Naomi?'

<sup>20</sup> 'Don't call me Naomi, she told them. 'Call me Mara, because the Almighty has made my life very bitter. <sup>21</sup> I went away full, but the LORD has brought me back empty. Why call me Naomi? The LORD has afflicted me; the Almighty has brought misfortune upon me.'

<sup>22</sup> So Naomi returned from Moab accompanied by Ruth the Moabite, her daughter-in-law, arriving in Bethlehem as the barley harvest was beginning.

## Reflection

Chapter 1 - a chapter that begins with famine and ends in harvest. A chapter that introduces the characters and today we focus on Orpah who is often seen as the poor relation, the one who deserted Naomi – or did she? Orpah is the one we very often give little thought to. The book of Ruth's central theme is a movement from emptiness to fulfilment in both agriculture and personal, but what does that mean to Orpah?

Orpah and Ruth both Moabites married foreigners – people from Bethlehem but why? Moabite women were believed to lead men astray and yet if we look at the root of the word in verse 4 married/took/lifted up, elsewhere it refers to abduction suggesting that Mahlon and Chilion first raped the women and then took them as their wives. So were they exploited or married for love. If the former, is it this an act of violence for which the brothers are judged. We need to listen to people's stories and not draw assumptions. I wonder how did our story begin and have you shared that with anyone? What are some of the plots and twists and how do we respond to them?

Naomi, Orpah and Ruth begin to return to Bethlehem where there is now food and Naomi attributes this to God, she is guided by the divine hand. But on the journey she tells her daughter-in-law's to return to their mother's house(not their father's), three times she urges them to return which number corresponds to the number of times that potential converts in Judaism should be strongly discouraged. How would Orpah feel returning to her family, she had deserted them for a foreigner, will they take her back, why shouldn't she go to Bethlehem after all now things were much better there, why should she be pushed away? Orpah leaves the story in verse 14 staying far longer than most would remember her for. She is loving and obedient, yet is overlooked. Are there people in life that we overlook because they don't push themselves to the fore? those people who don't speak out – what is going on in their lives.

Orpah returns to her family, she refuses to give up her identity and traditions and her hesed (loyalty and commitment that go beyond the bounds of law and duty) to her people and that should be praised.

Companions on a journey – maybe we need to pay heed to the people we meet on our journey because God meets us when we least expect. I wonder what reaction Orpah received when she arrived home and whether she ever kept in contact with Ruth and Naomi. Ruth's devotion and loyalty to Naomi, as seen in her plea, is one of the best known lines in the book. together they travel back to Bethlehem. Who has been part of your journey, who have you supported and who has supported you? We are all companions on a journey.
